● The Possibility Project (2024-2029)

A project to impact 10 million children over 5 years by raising more than \$25 million.



● The Eliminate Project (2010-) (Elimination of Maternal and Neonatal Tetanus)

A project commemorating 100 years of service by the Kiwanis International, to eliminate maternal and neonatal tetanus that causes tragic deaths to new born babies.



Together with UNICEF, we have provided vaccinations to 61 million mothers in developing countries by raising \$110 million.

The Japan District



The Kiwanis Club of Tokyo was established in 1964 as the first club in Asia Pacific region. In 2014, international convention was held in Makuhari to commemorate its 50th anniversary.

The Japan District was formed in 1977. As of today, there are more than 1,830 members in 40 clubs.

Activities of the Japan District

● **Kiwanis Doll**

Originated in 1988 in Melbourne, Australia, Kiwanis Dolls were introduced to Japan in 2001, and quickly spread to the clubs throughout the country. Around 40 cm in height and 50 g in weight, with no features, these dolls encourage children fighting diseases. More than 120,000 dolls were donated to hospitals or related facilities so far. Dolls are all handmade, by Kiwanians, middle school/high school students or in a corporate as a volunteer activity. Symposiums where manufacturers and users (hospital staffs) gather and exchange opinions are also conducted.



● **Child-abuse Prevention**



Most of the clubs in Japan are conducting child-abuse prevention activities specific to the community. Major activities include cooperation to Orange Ribbon Campaign, support to establish DV evacuation facilities, and support to childcare institutions.

● **Community-based Activities**

Many clubs engage in community-based activities that contribute to their society, such as:



- Utsunomiya: Field Trip for Preschoolers
- Fukuoka: The Butterfly Project
- Wakayama: Child-abuse Prevention Campaign
- Tokushima: Disaster Prevention Camp for Children
